# Sometimes the best things in life we

have to wait for, right? I think that's a dying concept in our fast-paced, technological world, but I still think it's true. I think we'd all agree that home-made ice cream is better than something from the store. I think we'd all agree that a slowroasted roast is better than something we'd microwave. For a teen or young adult, we'd probably advise they wait for a good partner in life than to rush ahead with someone who simply is around. And, hopefully, we all understand the reward of a project that's taken time and effort to accomplish (like a building project). But we get impatient in life. Our phones, I believe, have made us even more impatient in life. We expect to have everything literally at our fingertips in just a few seconds. And I'm as bad as anyone, but I feel like the more and more we lose that sense of patience and that appreciation for things that take time, the more we can pull away from the natural rhythms and certain enjoyments in life.

And patience is a complex virtue in our world. Often times we think of waiting for something to get accomplished or a job finished. Sometimes we think about needing patience in dealing with other people (okay, maybe that's more than sometimes.) But what's interesting about God's patience is that it's not really about a job that needs to be done or for patience with his children because they're tiring or exhausting. God's patience is really about love. In what seems like he's slow in accomplishing what he's promised is really a way that he's patience. Peter writes to us, "But do not overlook this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day. The Lord is not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that

all should reach repentance." (2 Peter 3.8-9) God's patience comes due to the desire that as many can come to faith in Jesus as possible. And his patience is really due to the fact, as Peter explains here, is that time is different for God than it is for us. If a day is truly as long as a thousand years and a thousand years is a day for God, then time really has little meaning. There's no reason he couldn't wait and wait and wait (as it would seem from our perspective) until as many can come to repentance as possible. And so, for me, I find these words encouraging. It means that time needs to be put into the appropriate context for us, too, especially when it comes to other people. Often times we want people to change, grow up or mature in our time (and usually that's quickly). But maybe, even when it's incredibly challenging and hard, we find ways to just be patient with them. We wait for God to work and for their hearts to change, and don't just give up on them or write them off. If we truly want to follow God's lead in bringing as many to repentance as possible, we're going to need lots of patience, too. And patience for people's behavior, patience for their attitudes and patience that is full of love and grace. Serving Him and you, Matthew
